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REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS

OCTOBER 31 - NOVEMBER 15, 2001

SPRING 2002

All currently-registered students who expect to return to CSB/SJU this Spring must complete advance registration by November 15th. Please follow these instructions carefully, for proper registration is your responsibility. If you have any questions about registration, call the Registrar's Office at 5260 (CSB) or 3396 (SJU).

STUDENTS ARE ELIGIBLE TO REGISTER ONLY IF THEY HAVE:

- Met with their advisor and obtained their Label with Registration PIN #
- Settled all current charges with the Student Accounts Office
- Been accepted by a department (unless they are a first-year student)
- Complied with Minnesota immunization regulations
- Have an active Network account

Students who are ineligible to register for any of these reasons may register on WEBSTER until January 17th, after all registration holds have been cleared.

All courses must be entered (via WEBSTER) by THURSDAY, November 15th at 12:00 midnight. We strongly urge you to meet with your advisor early and enter your registration on WEBSTER on the date listed on your PIN Label. **Registration is On-line, and delaying your registration will affect course selection.**

Please note that registration for ILP's (Individualized Learning Projects) and for special programs (Tri-College Exchange, Internships, etc.) requires your submission of special forms available from the Registrar's Office during the initial registration period (October 31st - November 15th). Registration for Internships (8 credits or more) are due the first day of classes.

REGISTRATION ADJUSTMENTS

Registration adjustments (Drop/Add) can be done on WEBSTER through January 17th. **You will need your Registration PIN# that you received from your Advisor.** After this date students must come to the Registrar's Office at SJU, Quad 163 or at CSB, Academic Service Building.

Listings of canceled or closed courses will be electronically updated on the Class Schedule Information on WEBSTER. Students should use WEBSTER to check whether a space has become available in a course that was previously closed. Courses may be added through the first 4 days of the semester.

If a course is closed, check whether there are any other sections of the same course which have spaces available in them and register for an alternate section. If this option is not available to you, consider alternate courses and select among these and register accordingly. Your advisor is a good resource to help determine an appropriate alternate. In some cases, it may be appropriate for the department chair or instructor to "override" a student beyond the course limit. Override registrations are completed by the student presenting a signed (department chair or instructor, as appropriate) drop/add card to the Registrar's Office.

We also ask that you use the "Request for Additional Course Spaces" menu item on WEBSTER registration to report a course that you wished to take but were unable to enroll in any section of. Your reporting this will help the colleges plan for possible limit changes or additional sections of the course-both for this semester and for future semesters. Please do not report a course if you were able to register for an alternate section of the same course. This request DOES NOT place you on a waiting list for the course.

REGISTRATION PRIORITY AND COURSE SELECTION

Registration priority is based first on class standing, then on the last four digits of your Social Security Number. Students who are studying abroad are given priority within their class. Seniors are assigned courses first, then juniors, sophomores and first-year students. Class standing is determined by earned credits, not by years in college. For Spring Semester registration, the highest (9999) four digits have the highest priority. You are encouraged to keep these priorities in mind when you develop your course requests. **WEBSTER will immediately respond to your course selection by indicating Enrolled or Closed.**

Instructions for Using WEBSTER

AT ANY NETWORKED PC:

Log on to the PC (your username and password)
Click on the START button
Select NETWORK PROGRAMS
Select INTERNET BROWSERS
Click on INTERNET EXPLORER or NETSCAPE
Enter <http://www.csbsju.edu/>
The CSB/SJU HOMEPAGE displays

FROM OTHER PC'S THAT HAVE ACCESS TO A WEB BROWSER:

Sign on as you normally would, then
Enter <http://www.csbsju.edu/>
The CSB/SJU HOMEPAGE displays

- Click on "Inside CSB/SJU". Then click on the word "Student Links" and click on "WEBSTER" on the left hand side under "ACADEMIC"
- Click on the **Spring term ONLINE Registration** Icon
- **At the Registration Login Screen**, Click on the box and **Enter your Student ID # (with no spaces or dashes) & Enter your PIN #** in the space labeled "PIN" (**PIN # is on the PIN Label you received from your advisor - Do not use your WSC**)
Click on the **Login** button **once**
- **At the Registration Login Verification Screen**
Click on the box and **Enter your PIN# again & then click on the Login button once**
- Click on **Spring Term Registration** - from the Main Registration Menu
Click on **Spring 2002** & then click on the **Select Term** button
- **To Enter your Spring Term Registration:**
Click on **ADD/DROP Courses**
Enter the 5 digit Call #'s for all of the courses you want to register for - call numbers are listed next to the course number in the Spring Class Schedule Booklet. Click on **Submit Registration** button - **you must click on this for your registration to be entered into the computer system.** If there is space in the courses you selected and if you meet the necessary prerequisites, the screen will display "**Registered Successfully**". It will also display the Course ID, Credits and Title of the courses that you have registered for. If a class is closed or you do not meet the prerequisite the screen will display "**Class Registration failed with error**" and a reason for the error.
- **To change the credits on a Variable Credit Course:**
Click on **Change Course Credit**
Enter the number of credits in the box (select from the range displayed) & click on **Submit Changes**
- **To check course availability:**
Click on **Look-up Class to Add**
Click on the name of the **Subject** and Click on **Select Subject** button
Click on the **Department and Course Number** and Click on **Select Course** button
This will display all the sections of that course, and under 'status' it will state 'open' or 'closed'
(Note: You may **not** be able to register for some courses that are 'open' because you do not meet the prerequisite or quota restrictions for that course.)
- **To request a course that you were unable to enroll in any section of:**
Click on **Request for Additional Course Spaces** - from Student Registration Menu
Enter the **5 digit Call #'s of the course(s) you were not able to enroll in** (this request DOES NOT place you on a wait list for the course).
Click on **Submit**
The screen will display "Courses Requested" or "Course Request Failed" and a reason
- **To change your Spring Registration:**
Click on **ADD/DROP Courses**
Click on the **down arrow in the Action Box** of the course you want to Drop
Click on **DROP**
Under **ADD Class fill in the Call #** of the new course you want to Add
Click on **Submit Registration Button** - **this will drop your course and add a new one at the same time. Keep your Registration PIN # - you may Drop/Add for Spring semester until January 17th.**
- **To send a copy of your Course Requests to the printer:**
Click on File from Menu Bar
Select Print & Click on OK
- **To sign off:**
Click on **Exit WEBSTER**
Exit Internet Explorer or Netscape
Log-off the PC

PLEASE NOTE:

If you have trouble operating the computer terminal when attempting to enter your Spring Term registration, please **(1) ask for assistance from the Computer access student employee, or (2) contact the Office of the Registrar.** The students who staff the Access Areas have been trained on the use of WEBSTER and are ready to respond to questions you may have while entering your registration.

DROP/ADD on WEBSTER

If you would like to drop and add courses for Spring Term 2002 you may do this through WEBSTER until January 17th. Please keep your Registration PIN #, you will need this to Drop/Add on WEBSTER. After this date you will need to drop and add courses in the Registrar's Office.

OBTAINING A NETWORK ACCOUNT

All students must have a NETWORK account to use WEBSTER from the Network PC's on campus. Most of you will already have an account, which you may use for many other functions besides course registration. If you do not have a Network account--or have forgotten your password or how to sign on--please follow these simple steps to obtain your Network account:

- Step #1:** Go the Computing Center at SJU, Quad 084, from 8:30 am - 4:30 pm
- Step #2:** Identify yourself as needing a Network account.
- Step #3:** Activate your account on one of the PC's in the computing center

PROBLEMS -- Discussed below are some common problems we expect some of you may encounter, and how you may solve them.

- **Your PIN # doesn't work.**
Solution: Re-check your label and carefully re-enter the PIN #. You may have to Exit WEBSTER completely and logon again. **YOUR PIN# for registration is not the same as your WSC (Webster Security Code) that you use to access Student Information on WEBSTER**
 Please note: the PIN # is not displayed (for security reasons) as you enter it on the computer.
- **You lost your PIN #.**
Solution: Contact your Advisor to get your Pin Number again, or bring your Advisor's signature to the Registrar's Office. (PIN #'s cannot be obtained in the Computer Access Areas)
- **You entered the wrong Call #.**
Solution: WEBSTER allows you to make changes to your registration. See the section on changing your fall registration in the "Instructions for using WEBSTER". You may make changes on WEBSTER through **January 17th**.
- **While using WEBSTER it displays: "This session for your Login has expired".**
Solution: WEBSTER is programmed to Log off of the Registration Screen if you **leave the screen idle for more than 2 minutes**. Should this happen simply sign on again. To do so, click on WEBSTER and then click on the Fall Registration icon and start over.
- **WEBSTER shows the status of a course as 'open' but it will not permit you to register for the course.**
Solution: You may not meet the prerequisites or quota restrictions for that course. Check the notes in the class schedule under that course or contact the Registrar's Office.

ESSENTIAL INFORMATION

ACADEMIC ADVISING

After receiving this Class Schedule booklet, visit your academic advisor to arrange a program of classes for next term, and have him or her place your PIN label on the Class Request Worksheet located on the back page of your Spring 2002 class Schedule Booklet.

If you intend to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. Overloads may be attempted only by students in good academic standing, and overloads of 20 or more credits require the student to see the Academic Advising Office.

AUDITING

Students intending to audit a course (earn no credit) should indicate their intent when registering for the course, or complete a Drop/Add card and file it with the Registrar during the first week of class. Auditors are expected to attend all regular classes, but they are not required to take final exams. A student who first registers for credit may change to auditor status any time during the first month of class. A student who first enrolls for auditor status may change to credit status only during the first week of class. Courses audited are not included in determining the total credits earned; however, the credit value of any course audited is computed in the assessment of tuition.

ADDING A CLASS

Thursday, January 17th is the last day you may ADD a full-term course to your program, unless the course's first meeting is scheduled after January 17th. No student may enroll for a full-term course after the second scheduled meeting without the instructor's consent.

DROPPING A CLASS

- **Feb. 6th** Last day to receive a permanent drop on your schedule
- **Apr. 9th** Last day to receive a "W" on your transcript. If you withdraw after this date, your instructor will assign you an "F" at the end of the semester.

For courses scheduled for less than a full term, withdrawal during the first third of the course will result in no record entry; during the second third, a "W" entry; during the final third, a failure.

EXEMPTION/SUBSTITUTION

In exceptional circumstances students may petition for exemption from specific academic regulations. Forms for requesting an exemption are available from the Registrar's Office. Students should first consult with their academic advisor, whose signature on the exemption form represents a recommendation that the request be considered favorably by the approving official. Department chairs are the approving officials for exemptions from requirements within majors and minors. Exemptions from academic regulations beyond major and minor fields require the approval of the academic dean of the student's college. Requests for these non-departmental exemptions should be directed to the Academic Advising Offices. The guiding principle in considering requests for any exemption is fidelity to the academic standards of the colleges.

INDIVIDUAL LEARNING PROJECTS

The guidelines and application forms for Individual Learning Projects, sometimes called Independent Study, are available in the Registrar's Office. If you are planning an ILP for spring term, please consult these guidelines. Remember, only 4 credits of ILP per term are allowed. You may indicate your intent to register for an ILP by requesting DNA 371-01A, Call #10332 or DNA 271-01A, Call #10331 through WEBSTER.

NOTE: Individual Learning Projects are normally not allowed during the Summer term.

POLICY ON INCOMPLETE GRADE

The policy concerning the temporary grade Incomplete (I) includes the following points:

When circumstances warrant, instructors may allow some delay in the completion of course work. Such extensions shall not extend beyond the close of the following regular (fall or spring) semester, and earlier limits may be set at the discretion of the instructor.

The instructor must report on the official grade roster the grade "I" followed by the approximate grade the student will receive if the course work is not complete by the end of the following semester (e.g., I/F, or I/C, or I/B). That grade will be used in the computation of grade point averages until the incomplete is removed.

If by the end of the following semester the instructor reports a single final grade to the Registrar, that grade will replace the I/GRADE, the incomplete will be removed, and averages recomputed accordingly. Otherwise the provisional grade which was assigned with the "I" will become a permanent part of the transcript.

Exceptions to the above may be granted only by the written permission of the appropriate Academic Dean. Such exceptions will ordinarily be granted only in cases of medical disability or problems of comparable seriousness.

Degree candidates are cautioned that failure to have all degree requirements satisfied (including removal of Incomplete grades in courses needed for graduation) by March 20th may result in postponement of their graduation.

INTERNSHIPS

All CSB/SJU students who plan to do an internship for 4 or more credits during the Summer or Fall of 2002 must enroll in the Pre-Internship Seminar. The January Pre-Internship Seminar—open to juniors and seniors only—meets during A mod, 8:00 am at SJU, or 2:40 pm at CSB.

This seminar is for no credit. If you wish to sign up for the seminar or if you have questions about other options, contact the Internship Office, Academic Services Building, phone 5799. ALL STUDENTS ARE REQUIRED TO ATTEND AN ADDITIONAL SESSION ON REGISTRATION, REQUIREMENTS, AND LEGAL ISSUES. CHECK WITH THE INTERNSHIP OFFICE FOR EXACT DATES. The last day to register for a spring internship is January 17th.

You may indicate your intent to register for an internship by requesting DNA 397-01A, Call #10335 through WEBSTER.

SUMMER INTERNSHIPS

All internships which take place during the summer must be registered under the summer term, rather than under either the preceding spring semester or the following fall semester.

The last day to register for a Summer Internship is April 30th. Registration after this date requires approval of the Academic Dean. You must have taken the Pre-internship seminar. If you have not done so contact Julie Christle, phone 5799 for information on alternative meetings before April 1st.

Please contact Jill Farry, CSB/SJU Director of Internships (Academic Service Building, Phone 5799), for information regarding special tuition structures for Summer Internships. Tuition fees for summer internship credits will be determined in March.

MODULAR SCHEDULING

Some departments offer courses of less than a full term's length; these courses begin and end according to the following dates and are called Modules, or "Mods". Each Mod is nine regular teaching periods and will be listed by the codes below in the Official Class Schedule:

ON TRACK

Advisors will have access to their advisees' On Track advising aid through WEB for Faculty Advising System. Please make an appointment to meet with your advisor early to review your academic progress and select your Spring coursework. Remember, all students **MUST** see their advisor to receive their WEBSTER Registration PIN # Label.

OVERLOAD

If you plan to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. Overload tuition fees will be \$500.00 per credit over 18. Students whose cumulative grade point average is below 2.00 may not register for an overload. Students in good academic standing (GPA above 2.00) may register for a maximum of 1 overload credit (19 credits overall) without permission. Credit totals of 20 or more require the student to see the Academic Advising Office. The WEBSTER registration system will not allow more than 19 credits.

REPEATING A COURSE

A course which has been failed may be repeated for credit. Courses which have been passed may not be repeated for credit. They may, however, be repeated for additional honor points. The original grade is not removed when the course is repeated and credit for a course can be earned only once.

The higher grade is computed in the GPA. If you are registering for a course which you are repeating you **MUST** notify the Registrar's Office.

STUDENT TEACHING

Students registering for student teaching (EDUC 361, 362, 363) in their 9th (or greater) semester as a full-time student at CSB/SJU will be billed at ½ the regular tuition rate for that semester. These students will also not be charged the student activity fee, technology fee, and campus center fee for that semester. Institutional gift aid (scholarships/grants) will not be available to these students. Student Teaching carries a \$120.00 fee.

STUDY ABROAD

CSB and SJU offer a number of group overseas study programs. Students who plan to enroll in one of these programs should contact the International Education Office, New Science Center #110 at SJU. Students who are considering enrolling in coursework offered abroad by another institution should contact the International Education Office or the Registrar's Office, for information on transfer of credits and readmission. Study Abroad Consortium registration will include a \$150.00 fee per semester for all students who register for Consortium/External Study Abroad.

S/U REGISTRATION

Arrangements for this non-honor point grading option should be made with your professor at the **beginning** of the course. Remember that undergraduates are limited in the number and types of courses they may take for the grade S (Satisfactory). See the Catalog for specific rules. First-year students may not take the S/U option except for a course with only S/U grades available. The grade S, once turned in by the instructor, is **NOT SUBJECT TO LATER CHANGE**.

Grading options are listed in the Class Schedule as either GRADING OPTION A-F REQUIRED OR GRADING OPTION S-U REQUIRED. If neither of these is listed, the instructor will permit eligible students to choose either option by the date the instructor specifies at the beginning of the course. Once you have chosen, you may not request that the S/U be changed to an honor point grade.

If coursework grades average below a C under the S/U option, the grade U (Unsatisfactory) will be given with no credit earned.

TRI-COLLEGE EXCHANGE

The College of Saint Benedict, Saint John's University, and Saint Cloud State University have an agreement which encourages regular full-time undergraduate students to take courses on any of the three campuses. If you are interested in taking courses at Saint Cloud State, you can pick up a copy of their Class Schedule and a registration application at the Registrar's Office. If a course seems suitable for your program of studies, see your advisor for permission to register. To register, file the approved application with the Registrar's Office at the St. John's campus before January 3rd. The course will be added to your Spring Term Program of Studies if space is available.

CSB/SJU students will be billed tuition, and other fees, at CSB/SJU rates. If a student is not registered for more than 18 total credits, there will ordinarily be no additional charge. For credits over 18, an additional tuition charge of \$500.00 will be made for each additional semester credit hour.

If you have any questions about Tri-College Exchange and the suitability of SCSU courses toward your degree program, see Jane Simon in the Registrar's Office, QUAD 163.

TRANSCRIPT SERVICE

Current students may request an unofficial copy of their transcript at no charge from the Registrar's Office by presenting a picture ID. Official transcript requests must be submitted in writing to the Registrar's Office and may be picked up at the Registrar's Office (or we can mail them for you) 2-3 days after the request is made, except during the first and last week of each term.

Former students may request a transcript copy for \$3.00 per transcript. The fee for faxing a transcript (former students) will be \$3.00 per transcript. If the transcript is faxed outside the U.S. the fee will be a minimum of \$5.00. All transcript requests must be submitted in writing via mail or fax and payment must accompany the order.

WITHDRAWAL FROM COLLEGE

Complete withdrawal from all of your courses during the term must be initiated with your Residential Director at CSB, or the Campus Life and Housing Office, Sexton 127 at SJU. If you withdraw by February 6th, no official record of your registration for that term will be made. If you withdraw between February 7th and April 9th the mark "W" will appear behind that term's courses on your transcript. If you withdraw after April 9th, all courses for that term will be followed by the grade of "F". If you decide to withdraw after the term ends, you **MUST** notify the office mentioned above.

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO ALL MINNESOTA STUDENTS ELIGIBLE FOR THE MINNESOTA GRANT PROGRAM:

You must register for a minimum of 15 credits each semester to receive a Minnesota Grant at the full-time student rate. Students who register for 12-14 credits may still receive a Minnesota Grant but the award amount will be substantially reduced. Please direct any questions to the Financial Aid Office at SJU or CSB. (For all other aid programs, 12 credits is still considered full-time.)

The academic calendar concludes each semester with a one-day study and four-day test cycle. Faculty may administer final exams for their classes only during the exam periods officially scheduled by the Registrar's Office. Cumulative final examinations may not be given during the regularly scheduled class days of the semester. If there is to be a cumulative final exam in a course, all exams given during the semester must be returned for student review by the last scheduled day of class.

Instructors of each full-term course are expected to announce at the beginning of the course whether a written two hour final examination will be given. Such an exam will be administered during the four day test cycle according to the schedule above. Note that a class is assigned a test time and day in the schedule according to the cycle and time period it meets during the semester. Classes which meet after Period V may use their last regularly scheduled class period for a final exam.

One period has been reserved on each of the four test days for the administration of a common exam for multiple-section courses who so desire. A list of such courses, and their exam times, will be announced this spring. The legend, MS, in the accompanying chart signifies times set aside for these multi-section common exams.

The classroom assignments or campus locations of some classes listed in this Schedule may be changed before the term begins. Students MUST consult their Program of Study printout they will receive in January just before classes begin.

All full-time evening classes begin the first week of the semester unless otherwise stated.

SPRING 2002 COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

CHEMISTRY

CHEM XXX: Chemistry Comp Exam

Graduating chemistry majors are required to take a comprehensive exam in chemistry. The comprehensive exam which will be administered in Spring 2002 is the Major Field Achievement Test in Chemistry, published by the Educational Testing Service (ETS). The purpose of the exam is to determine students' level of mastery and retention of the important concepts in major areas of chemistry. This course is required for May, September, and December 2002 graduates.

COMMUNICATION

COMM 302: Public Address (HMU)

This course examines the rhetorical approaches taken by individuals, groups, or institutions to repair a damaged public reputation. This course will explore the genre of public address known as "self-defense," or "self-justification." Students will read theoretical articles on public address and apologia and will apply the theories and concepts to rhetorical texts (speeches, letters, books, and public relations campaigns). The class will be a discussion-based seminar. Students will make class presentations, lead class discussions, research historical events, analyze texts, and write theoretical and analytical papers. Students will complete a major research project.

COMM 383-01A: Culture, Communication and the Construction of News (HMU)

The role of the news industry in a democracy is to inform and socialize the citizenry for participation within the democracy. What are the consequences for the nature of that information when the news industry is profit-driven? How do decisions about the "bottom line" influence decisions about an event's newsworthiness? This course will examine issues of ownership, the influence of advertising and public relations, and factors within the routines of production that help determine the content of news. We will also examine how coverage of specific issues and events (national and international politics, race and race-related issues) shapes our understanding of them

PREREQUISITE: COMM 103 or COMM 245 or permission of instructor

COMM 383-02A: Layout and Design

Explores the creative side of advertising, PR and journalism, by teaching the fundamentals of QuarkXpress (layout software) and Adobe Photoshop. Students will learn the basic rules of design and layout. Projects will require students to participate in service learning and use skills learned in other mass communication classes.

COMM 385: Communication Dysfunction: The Dark Side of Human Relationships

As we all know, relationships can be both heavenly and hellish. Most relational communication courses emphasize the positive and pleasant aspects of human interaction, while overlooking the darker side of relationships. Such an approach may give us a "warm fuzzy" feeling about relationships, but it is an incomplete perspective. We may be baffled and confused when we encounter the unhealthy elements of our own and other's human nature in relationships. To fully understand how to effectively function in relationships requires that we consider how individuals perpetuate, participate in, and cope with social interaction that is difficult, problematic, challenging, disruptive, and distressing.

Come and take a walk on the dark side for a semester. Communication Dysfunction (COMM 385), will be an examination of the less than healthy side of human relationships. Primary topics for the course will include: verbal/emotional abuse, social ineptitude, gossip, deception, infidelity and other relational transgressions, jealousy, and sexual harassment, physical abuse, and stalking.

CORE - SENIOR SEMINARS

CORE 390-01A: Gender, Science and Objectivity

Kate Graham and Chuck Wright

This course is cross-listed with GWST 390.

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make good moral decisions. In public debates over controversial moral and political issues, participants often appeal to 'objective' scientific evidence to justify their positions. By studying some of the social biases that have shaped the practice of science, students will learn to treat such appeals with caution.

This class will critically evaluate the perceived objectivity of scientific investigation by examining evidence documenting the gender prejudices of modern science. We will start by defining key concepts of gender and science and move to an exploration of the historical origins and culture of science. Through studies and personal biographies we will then address the issue of inequities in women's access to education and employment in science. In the last section of the class, we will examine how social bias can affect the funding and practice of scientific work.

Specific topics will include: gender assumptions shaping evolutionary explanations of female sexuality; the effect of masculine bias upon funding decisions and experimental design in medical research; the influence of gender assumptions upon accounts of human reproduction; traditional sex role expectations in evolutionary accounts of the human family.

CORE 390-02A: Medical Ethics in the 21st Century

Henry Jakubowski

New understandings of the molecular and cellular bases of life are leading to profound changes in the practice of medicine, a system which in this country is still based on the treatment of disease instead of the preservation of health. A quick glance at daily newspapers tells us that the development of new therapies and technologies has far outstripped discussions on how these practices should be used. We are entering the "post-genomic" era, when the DNA blueprint that determines our humanity has been deciphered. Using this information, we can now diagnose fatal genetics diseases but can't provide effective treatments methods to hinder their progress. We now prescribe powerful antidepressants to four-year old children without considering other methods that may address the underlying causes of their symptoms. New drugs are in development that may make us smarter, stronger, and less tired, yet little discussion has focused on how these drugs should be used. We are all partakers in the health care system, and we will all have to make vital decisions about health care for ourselves, our families, and ultimately our society. Join in a discussion of bioethics in the 21st century, as we explore theories of moral philosophy and the specific ethical issues involved in developing and using a health care system in the "post-genomic" era, with the ultimate goal of increasing not only your understanding of the medicine of the future, but also your ability to make good moral judgments about its use.

CORE 390-03A: Social Issues and the Law

Tim Robinson

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make good moral judgments on issues that affect our lives

Making decisions for ourselves can be complicated enough. The complications just get worse when we have to make a decision on behalf of all of us. But that's just what legislators and judges do, and it's what every citizen does who walks into a voting booth. In this course we'll practice sorting out the complexities of collective decision-making by focusing on a couple of issues of current interest. Possible topics include capital punishment, abortion, affirmative action, the morality of war, and others. For guidance, we will call on philosophical analyses of ethics and politics, and on examples of practical reasoning exhibited in judicial opinions. We'll look at several court cases, both real and imaginary. No previous training in law or philosophy required.

CORE 390-04A: Reading for Life

Tony Cunningham

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make good moral judgments on issues that affect our lives.

Everyone loves a good story. Yet, great literature can provide us with far more than idle recreation. Stories can often provide us with rich character portraits that can reveal the subtleties and nuances of what it means to live well and responsibly. In this course we shall use novels and films to address Socrates' most basic ethical question: "How should one live?" We shall do so by attending to all the concrete, particular

details of real-life and fictional characters thoroughly embroiled in the "business of living." Reading well offers the possibility of vicarious experience and ultimately, ethical insight. Unlike abstract ethical theories, this course will *not* offer a systematic, "how to" approach to ethics. Indeed, one of the things we shall discuss is how standard ethical theories like utilitarianism and Kantian ethics (the most dominant ethical theories in the Western philosophical tradition) provide a unified, systematic view of our ethical responsibilities at the *expense* of ignoring or disfiguring what human beings are really like in all their complexity and beauty. This course will make an attempt to help students make better moral judgments in the sense of better appreciating the competing values that make appeals on a human life. Literature and real-life experience have special powers in this vein because appreciating what *matters* is *not* merely a matter of engaging in an intellectual exercise in philosophical argument and analysis.

CORE 390-05A: The Values of Myths and Folktales

Andreas Kiryakakis

From the earliest documents of the Near East to the contemporary period, myths and folktales have been used to examine the concepts and principles that underlie our evaluation of human conduct. Critical thinkers like Alexander Heidel, C.W. Ceram, C.G. Jung and Marie-Louise von Franz all see these stories as models for human behavior, which give meaning and value to life.

In this seminar we will examine this idea by asking: what standards should we use to distinguish between morally right and morally wrong actions, and to what extent do these stories help us make good moral judgments about issues that affect our lives. Most of the time in class will be spent in discussions of the readings and our reflections on our readings and our experiences. Occasionally, we will use debates, group discussions and role-playing to aid us in our investigation. Evaluations will include short reaction papers, reports and a substantive journal.

CORE 390-06A: Visions of the Good Life

Steve Wagner

This course will look at some of the most prominent moral theories in the tradition of western philosophical thought. Our goal we will be to consider whether these views provide adequate guides for living a good life. We will look at aspects of the moral views of Plato, Aristotle, Thomas Hobbes, John Stuart Mill, Immanuel Kant and Albert Camus. We will also investigate a number of views which claim to offer variations or alternatives to these classical western models, such as feminist thought or virtue ethics. We will use a number of literary texts in our attempt to gain moral insight, reading *The Stranger*, *The Remains of the Day*, *Their Eyes Were Watching God* and *The Plague*. As we consider whether we can find guidance for our own lives in these readings, our focus throughout will be to develop in ourselves the ability to make good moral judgments.

CORE 390-07A: Art and Morality: Is It Art If . . . ?

James Hendershot

Through active involvement, course participants will be developing their own moral framework to deal with the issues addressed by the art world. We will have a chance to apply this framework to some real problems addressed by artists and their works. Students will be shown some techniques of analysis through a series of discussing articles, visiting galleries, and tracking the involvement of the various media (television, newspaper and publications). Seeing the art world from the view of moral critical analysis will be dealt with in groups of 3-4 students. The final project will involve going beyond the limits of the classroom to acquire the information necessary to complete the assignment. The process of gathering information is an important step so the participants will need to sharpen their innovative research skills.

Participants will raise questions ancient and modern: Does producing art to promote social issues end up destroying art? Are the values of art more important than social values? And on the lighter side, a sculpture placed in a pasture used as a backscratcher, is it art? Participants will be required to read and discuss assignment materials in class and to develop a project independently or cooperatively (pairs). They will work on a schedule for viewing or experiencing the works which they wish to study, collect appropriate data, share it with the class, and discuss it in terms of the core theme, art and morality. The prime goal of the course is to be able to gain insight into what it means to make good moral judgments about Art, its creation and its use.

CORE 390-08A: Ethics in Parents' Memoirs

Cynthia Malone

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make good moral judgments on issues that affect our lives.

Adopting or giving birth to a child radically transforms the lives of adults responsible for raising this child. We will consider some of the charged

and complex moral choices that parents face: how to shape the material and social environment of the child; how to guide the development of values; how to honor the needs and desires of all family members. We will also attend to the constraints that limit parents' choices, including poverty, illness, and violence. Through parents' memoirs, presentations by guest speakers, discussion, and writing, we will examine the ethical commitments that shape parents' choices.

CORE 390-09A: The Values of Myths and Folktales

Andreas Kiryakakis

From the earliest documents of the Near East to the contemporary period, myths and folktales have been used to examine the concepts and principles that underlie our evaluation of human conduct. Critical thinkers like Alexander Heidel, C.W. Ceram, C.G. Jung and Marie-Louise von Franz all see these stories as models for human behavior, which give meaning and value to life.

CORE 390-10A: War and the Memory of War in the Last Century

Nick Hayes

War and the role our memory of war has played in the shaping of the human mind and culture in the twentieth century forms the basic content of the seminar. We have selected only several tragic conflicts from the European and American experience WWI (or "The Great War"), WWII, the Vietnam War, and the Wars of the ex-Yugoslavia in the 1990s. Our theme lies in the escalation of total war from the First World War with its devastating military casualties through the subsequent wars that brought massive civilian destruction, genocide and atrocities. Moreover, our emphasis is not on the history of those conflicts but on how those conflicts shaped the memories and hence the political cultures of their times. How, in short, have Americans and Europeans come to grips with the reality of total war and its inhumanity in the history of their civilization over the past century.

What is more, it places a priority on the ethical issues posed in the war experience in the twentieth century. In keeping with the general goals of the Senior Seminar Program in the CORE Curriculum, our aim focuses on the ethical issues contained in responsibility and conduct of warfare in the twentieth century and aims to contribute to the student's ability to make sound moral judgments on issues that profoundly affect our lives.

The core reading of the course are John Keegan, *The First World War*, Stephen Ambrose., *Citizen Soldiers*, Wolfgang Borchert, *The Man Outside*, Tim O'Brien, *The Things They Carried* and Misha Glenny, *The Fall of Yugoslavia*. In addition, the course examines the images of the war experience in films, poetry, song, and popular culture.

CORE 390-11A: Ethics in Society

Carmen Mulcahy

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make good moral judgments on issues that affect our lives.

What are the challenges of daily life which affect people? Whether these challenges come from government, business, economic conditions, health administration or clinical health care, how do we meet them? Today the word "ethics" is frequently used. How is it understood? Various kinds of media presentations, though concerned with problems of an ethical nature, are explored apart from professional, philosophical, or ethical guidelines or principles. The question arises as to where and how people are helped to function ethically.

Through reading, discussion, and writing, situations in society and ethical implications will be explored. Case studies, films, and speakers will be utilized.

CORE 390-12A: Great Poets/Life Questions

Mark Thamert, OSB

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make good moral judgments on issues that affect our lives.

This Senior Seminar will feature such great world poets as Jalaluddin Rumi, Piblo Neruda, Rainer Maria Rilke, Shakespeare and the Poet of the *Book of Job* as well as modern classic poems by writers like Stephane Mallarmé, Sekou Sundiata, Li Ch'ing-chao, Michael Ondaatje, Margaret Atwood, Claribel Alegría and Carolyn Forché. The emphasis of this course is to explore together how poetry motivates its readers to examine and change their lives. Students will be asked to learn by heart several poems which ring most profoundly for them, for, as poet Molly Peacock

writes, "Each time any of us reads a favorite poem, it conjures a special sorcery of second sight and third and fourth, until understanding is so profound that we are returned to a state before we even had language...That is why it is so hard to say exactly what a poem means. Yet how rare - and thrilling - to be struck dumb in the face of some of the world's greatest poetry." Texts for the course will likely include *The Poetry of Our World*, ed. Jeffrey Paine; *The Rag and Bone Shop of the Heart*, ed. Hillman; *A Book of Luminous Things*, ed. Czeslaw Milosz; *How to Read a Poem – and Fall in Love with Poetry*, by Edward Hirsch.

CORE 390-13A: Benedictine Values and the Worker

Ann Marie Biermaier OSB

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make good moral judgments on issues that affect our lives.

This course is designed to assist the student in developing a positive attitude toward work and to be guided in creating a healthy work ethic. The course will present various avenues for exploring the concept of work, some healthy and unhealthy attitudes toward work, the Benedictine values that apply in a work setting, and potential ethical and moral issues encountered in a work environment.

This class will be conducted with a heavy emphasis on discussion with students assuming the responsibility for getting the class started on the readings assigned for the day. There will be guest speakers to learn how they have grappled with the work environment they've encountered.

CORE 390-14A: Philosophical, Ethical, and Religious Issues in Computer Science

Noreen Herzfeld

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make good moral judgments on issues that affect our lives.

Should robots be baptized? Will artificially intelligent computers eventually replace human beings? Should scientists stop researching in fields such as artificial intelligence or nanotechnology in order to safeguard future lives? When a computer malfunctions, who is responsible? Do humans have a right to individual privacy? How will cyberspace change our relationships to each other or to God? This course will examine a variety of questions that arise within the field of computer science from the perspectives of scientific, religious, and ethical thought. Students will become familiar with methodologies in each of these areas and will apply these approaches to moral decision making in several areas of computer technology, including artificial intelligence, nanotechnology, software development, and the use of cyberspace.

We live in a society in which computers are becoming ubiquitous, both as tools in our scientific endeavors and as a component of our everyday lives. This course is designed to help both computer science majors and those who might use computers extensively in their careers to integrate their orientation as scientists and users of technology with their personal belief system so that they can make better informed decisions as professionals and see their lives as an integrated whole.

ECONOMICS

ECON 329: Economics of Health Care

Emphasis on the application of economic reasoning to an understanding of the health care system of the United States. Evaluation of the changing nature of health care and its consequences for the medical professions and institutions. Analysis of public policy for provision and financing of health care.

PREREQUISITE: ECON 111

EDUCATION

EDUC 390: Human Relations

Education majors/minors and School Social Work majors only.

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make good moral judgments on issues that affect our lives.

Participants examine the areas of ethical analysis which include, but are not limited to oppression, racism, prejudice, discrimination, sexism, homophobia, exceptionalism, ageism and conditions of poverty so as to appreciate diverse perspectives. Focus is on interpersonal values consciousness in relation to minorities and other oppressed groups in our changing society. This course fulfills Senior Seminar (Core 390) requirement for Education majors/minors and School Social Work majors.

PREREQUISITE: Junior standing, acceptance to the teacher education program or school social work program.

ENGLISH

ENGL 220: Topics in Research

This course will focus on the theory and practice of research in literary and cultural studies. The course will begin with a researched reading and annotation of a volume of poetry (possibly Anne Sexton's *Transformations*). We will then read and annotate a historical novel (possibly E. L. Doctorow's *Ragtime*). We will also read and research the contexts of a work of cultural theory. These three elements of the course will involve large and small group research and discussion. Then each student, in consultation with the instructor, will develop and explore his or her own research topic. The course will conclude with individual presentations of each research project. Students will be encouraged to find and develop topics that interest them and that also allow them to become familiar with techniques and practices of research in their discipline.

This course is good preparation for honor's thesis writers in the humanities, literary studies and cultural studies.

ENGL 355: Dante

Cross-listed with CORE 366

"Dante and Shakespeare divide the world between them; there is no third." T. S. Eliot

Dante Alighieri's imaginative journey through Hell, Purgatory, and Heaven during Holy Week of the year 1300 has fascinated, inspired, and disturbed readers since its composition near the end of the high middle ages. Dante gathered the learning and lore of the past and the present together: Homer, Virgil, Greek and Roman philosophy and mythology, the Hebrew and Christian scriptures, the history of Europe since Roman times; the current fanciful geographies and biographies of the great (and the gossip about them); the political, ecclesiastical, and literary events of his time. All this, and more, is brought to bear on the enduring questions: What is the meaning of human life and how does one lead a good life? What awaits us after death? How can human institutions be reformed to serve the best interests of humanity? At the center of his answers to these questions is the figure of Jesus Christ, whose dying and rising forever altered the course of human history. Dante takes an unflinching look at human weakness and depravity, but his great work is, at its core, a comedy--a dramatic action with a happy ending--because of Christ's redemptive work made available through a thoroughly human institution, the Roman Catholic Church. Dante's ability to depict recognizable individuals accepting or rejecting Christ's offered redemption established a hallmark for Catholic art, literary and plastic. This course is intended to explore both the dense background of this work and will attempt to account for its artistic excellence.

ENGL 367: Studies in Contemporary Literature

In this course, we will study American novels, short stories, and poems beginning in an era when your parents were born and coming up to your own lifetime. Besides the culture that most students at our colleges have experienced, we will reflect upon several kinds of American experience - Asian, African American, American Indian. The course emphasizes how experience is portrayed, especially ironic and comic portrayals.

ENGL 381: Literature by Women: Latin American Feminisms

This course used towards the Gender and Women's Studies minor.

From "Foolish Men" by Sor Juana de la Cruz

"For plain default of common sense
Could any action be so queer
As oneself to cloud the mirror
Then complain that its not clear?"

Women writers from diverse geographical regions and tribes in Latin America have struggled to contest a male-dominated literary world since the colonial period. Beginning with the 17th Century Mexican nun who complained about the machista double-standard in the stanza above, this course provides an overview of some of the most influential (and the most insolent) Latin American women's textual rebellions. While these women are all interested in describing and contesting patriarchy, their similarities end there. Separated by class, color, aesthetic choices, political commitments, and sexuality, these women often disagree about how to challenge the social limitations imposed upon them by patriarchy. They also use and productively abuse ideas from North American and European feminists.

We will be careful to situate our readings in their very specific local and historical contexts. Still, because the debates in which these texts engage resonate with other feminisms, this course will prepare students with a vocabulary and a set of tools to approach other women's writing as well. Here are some of the questions these texts will consider:

Is there a particularly "feminine" mode of writing? Are some genres better than others for women's stories?

What sorts of aesthetic innovations have women writers contributed to literature? What sorts of literary structures are these innovations meant to subvert?

What happens when the writings of indigenous women are translated into Spanish? And English? What difference does language make?

How do we understand the role of the stereotypically dark, sexually voracious, magical Latin American woman in these writings by women?

What separates those very popular texts (*Like Water For Chocolate*, for example, which was much more popular as a novel and as a film in the US than in its own Mexico) from those that struggle to gain more than a very specialized readership?

After Sor Juana, our survey will consider women's writing from the most bourgeois to the most revolutionary. Authors may include: Rosario Castellanos, Ana Lydia Vega, Laura Esquivel, Rosario Ferre, Isabel Allende, Angeles Mastretta, Elena Poniatowska, Rigoberta Menchu and Elizabeth Burgos-Debray, and Luisa Valenzuela. Our readings of Latin American women writers will occasionally be accompanied by selections from other feminists that provide particularly helpful intellectual contexts for the work at hand (Woolf, de Beauvoir, Millet, Franco, Sommer).

Spanish majors welcome-texts may be read in Spanish. All texts will be taught in English translations.

GENDER AND WOMEN STUDIES

GWST 290: Women's Lives in a Global Perspective

This course will investigate the lives of women around the world and some of the forces that shape the quality of their daily existence: family traditions, economic necessity and religious influences. One of the important topics of this class will be the impact of women's work in agriculture and business and how their contributions affect both their lives and their country's economy.

We will also study how women and children are affected by poverty and disease and the efforts begging made to alleviate such problems. Along with the suffering of women worldwide due to various forms of violence, the course will investigate the positive role of women in sustaining their communities, in fighting prejudice and war, and in improving their environment. The lives of women involved in politics, medicine and education around the globe will inspire and guide our investigation.

Students will use an intercultural model to consider western forms of feminism along with those of developing countries. The emphasis here will be on understanding what various groups can learn from each other.

Through readings, discussion and films, students in this course will be exposed to a broader reality of women's lives observed in an international context. Through personal research on selected topics, students will deepen their understanding of the specific issues facing women and perhaps choose to become involved through continued education and/or activism.

GWST 390: Gender, Science and Objectivity

Kate Graham and Chuck Wright

Cross-listed with CORE 390. See description under CORE-390-01A

HISTORY

HIST 200: Sophomore Colloquium

Topic: The History of Saint John's University and the College of Saint Benedict

Our two institutions are located within several historical contexts: the history of Minnesota, of religious orders, of education, of America, of gender. In addition, both SJU and CSB have their own development and history jointly and separately. Through extensive reading and original research we will explore these various rich topics together. This class is designed for probably history majors and intends to draw students into "doing" rather than "receiving" history. Much of the work will be hands on in a seminar format. Our readings will include Fr. Colman Barry, *Worship and Work* (about SJU), S. Grace McDonald, *With Lamps Burning* (about CSB) and *With Hearts Expanded* by S. Carol Berg, S. Emmanuel Renner, S. Evin Rademacher and S. Olivia Forester, (about CSB). We will plan to work, in addition, among primary documents in the archives of both institutions.

HIST 389: Historiography and Methods Topic: The Third Reich

This course belongs to the set of courses required for the major, and it is intended to impress upon students that history is not merely what has happened in the past - it is also, perhaps more importantly, the act of interpreting the past. We will concern ourselves with history as a profession and a way of understanding the world. Students will quickly

learn that historians do not always agree in their interpretations of the past, even when they are studying the same topics and sources. The course demands a significant amount of reading. Readings will include several monographs on individual themes, analyses of different interpretations of selected topics, and primary sources. The written assignments will include book reviews and a lengthy review essay on a topic selected by the student in consultation with the instructor.

The specific topic of this course is the Third Reich (1933-1945). After reading an introductory text to provide a common background, we will move on to an excellent work by Ian Kershaw that compares the interpretations of many historians regarding fundamental questions about the Third Reich, to monographs, and to primary sources in English translation. This course will provide the opportunity to examine the Third Reich in much greater detail than is possible in HIST 140 and HIST 344.

HONORS

HONR 210: EVOLUTION OF SCIENTIFIC THOUGHT

In this course we will study science in its historical context by examining two quite different "scientific revolutions", those associated with Copernicus and Einstein. The Copernican revolution resulted, by the time of Newton, in a complete reformulation of the principles of both physics and astronomy. The second revolution, associated with Einstein, is still taking place, and has drastically reshaped our notions of space, time, gravity, and matter. The course will examine these two scientific revolutions, and in the process will discuss in a historical context how science operates (the "scientific method"), and the nature of scientific development and change. We will also discuss the relation of science and the rest of society, and see, for example, that science has strong connections to such subjects as philosophy, literature, and religion. In this context we will examine the trial of Galileo in detail, and examine the importance of such "sciences" as astrology and alchemy and how they affected science and western thought generally.

Texts will include Thomas Kuhn's (*Structure of Scientific Revolutions*), Stillman Drake's (*Discoveries and Opinions of Galileo*), Richard Westfall's (*Essays on the Trial of Galileo*) and Banesh Hoffmann's biography of Einstein (*Albert Einstein, Creator and Rebel*). Course requirements will include papers, essay midsemester and final exams (open book), occasional reports, and a laboratory.

HONR 230: Music Through History (FA)

An introduction to music in its historical and cultural perspective from ancient Greek to contemporary. Emphasis is placed on Western and other than Western cultures. Includes attendance at live performances. For music minors and non-music majors.

HONR 240: Christian Tradition (TH)

An introduction to the discipline of Christian theology with a substantial focus on select themes and texts of the scriptures, such as creation, covenant, kingdom, prophets, gospel and New Testament letters. Attention is also given to the method of theological study and the development of the Christian tradition since Biblical times. Students will be introduced to the Biblical languages, especially Hebrew, and will learn to think critically both about the Bible and about modern theological controversies.

HONR 250: Who Were the Greeks?

Who built the Parthenon, and how was it paid for? Who were the jurors who condemned Socrates, and how did they live? When the victorious Athenians came home after winning the battle of Marathon, what sort of houses did they come home to? This class will approach Greek literature, philosophy, and history as aspects of a complete culture, and will supplement our readings with a look at what we can tell about public and private lives through art and archaeological remains as well as texts. We will make extensive use of Perseus 2.0, an extensive interactive database now available on networked Macintoshes on campus, which students will learn to use, and on which they will have projects to do.

HONR 311: Great Books

This is a year-long discussion-based seminar that concentrates on some of the world's greatest works of literature, philosophy, and intellectual history. Authors may include Augustine, Euripides, Austen, Thoreau, Biblical writers, Camus, Dostoevsky, Tolstoy, Eliot, Faulkner, Pynchon, Freud, Homer, Kafka, Melville, Dinesen, Flannery O'Connor, Plato, Nabokov, Shakespeare, Cervantes, Virginia Woolf, and others. Registration is by permission of the instructor only. All students in this course purchase a personal library consisting of roughly 100 books, and students are required to do some reading during the summer.

HONR 340/350: Christianity in Relation to Judaism

This course explores the emergence of Christianity within and from Judaism, the de-Judaization of Christianity, traditional Christian teachings about Judaism, anti-Jewish formulations of Christian faith, contemporary Christian affirmations of Judaism's abiding validity, and the implications of these new affirmations for Christian self-understanding and for Christian-Jewish relations.

MANAGEMENT

MGMT 305-01A: Consumer Behavior

Examines the process of consumer decision making. Studies the consumer in regards to motivation, personality, lifestyle, attitudes, and cultural and social influences. Emphasizes the use of research and theory in developing marketing strategies.

MGMT 305-02A: International Finance

This course examines the international dimensions of finance. The financial management of a multinational corporation is more complex than the management of a strictly domestic enterprise. This course also provides a conceptual framework for the key financial decisions that a multinational corporation must make. Topics include the balance of payments, the determination of exchange rates, methods of hedging exchange rate volatility, short-term and long-term financing, the cost of capital for a multinational, multinational capital budgeting, and international cash management.

PREREQUISITE: MGMT 201, ECON 111, ACCT 113

MGMT 305-03A: Management Information Systems

Conceptual foundations of MIS, roles of computer-based information systems in organizations, global and ethical issues in MIS, and business application software with an emphasis on database management systems.

PREREQUISITE: MGMT 241

MATHEMATICS

MATH 114 02A & 04A: Math Explorations

Jerry Lenz

Mathematics Through History. This course will use topics from the history of mathematics to motivate and inform the study of mathematics. Various historical topics will be considered, including those from the ancient Greek and Chinese cultures.

MATH 114 03A: Math Explorations

Dave Hartz

Mathematics and Geometry have been used in Art in a variety of ways. The use and non-use of symmetry has been important in art in many areas and many cultures, from Classical Greek architecture, to the arts from the native Pacific islanders, to African sculpture, and on up to the present time. Repeating patterns are used in wallpaper and tile design and in many areas of Islamic art. The invention and development of linear perspective in renaissance art influenced, and was influenced by, the development of projective geometry. The Dutch painter M. C. Escher explicitly uses ideas from non-euclidean geometry in his work. We will examine some of these topics and other topics including geometric constructions, origami, quilt patterns, soap bubbles, and other dimensions.

MODERN AND CLASSICAL LANGUAGES

MCLT 223: Gender, Structure & the Fairy Tale

This course is taught in English

This course will count towards the GWST minor

The goal of this course is to develop students' awareness of the universality of fairy tale motifs, discuss critically how the narrative structure of fairy tales influences our lives, and analyze the roles gender and culture play in the collection, revision, adaptation, and selection of fairy tales.

Who are the heroes/heroines of fairy tales? How do male/female tasks differ? Does gender affect the distribution of family configurations (mother-daughter, father-son) in tales? From what source does the fairy tale derive its power? Students compare and analyze various interpretations of fairy tales, such as anthropological, psychological, sociological, biographical and feminist, and discuss and analyze the reception of tales in different eras or countries.

The course focuses on European tales (Scandinavian, Grimm, Andersen) and selected Greek myths, African, Native American, and Asian tales. Students view selected films outside of class.

Women in Western culture are said to be imprisoned in the circular structure of a fairy tale: marriage is the expected *end*. We analyze the recent drive to revise fairy tales ("Fractured Fairy Tales," "Politically Correct Bedtime Tales"). Some students may qualify for the creative option to write a fairy tale-- for the 21st century! Among the books we may read are:

GERM 334: The Turn of the Century (1890-1918)

Taught in German

PREREQUISITE: German 212

In many ways the hoopla surrounding Y2K paled in comparison to the hope and fear with which many German authors greeted the turn of the 20th century. One image in particular dominated German literature from 1890 to 1918: the idea of the apocalypse. Its symbolic representation as a cleansing fire suggests the birth of the new, as well as the death of the old. Not surprisingly, German culture of the *fin de siècle* was split between two extremes: conservative nostalgia for the world that was dying and a radical desire to destroy the old. For the first time in German history, an autonomous youth culture emerged, creating the art of *Jugendstil* and *Expressionismus*, before World War I ended this period of youthful optimism. We will examine both extremes in German culture: the fascination with death and decline associated with Vienna and the revolutionary spirit identified with Berlin.

MCLT 340: Gender and Modern Culture: The Dilemma of Difference

Taught in English

No special knowledge of literature required.

One of the most significant events in the history of modern Europe has been the entry of women into public life. French philosopher Luce Irigaray believes this process has made relations among the sexes the most burning ethical issue of our day. Simply put: *If men and women have been created differently, can they ever be equals?* This course grapples with the dilemma of sexual difference by examining a variety of poetic and theoretical texts from a predominantly German tradition that includes canonical authors (Nietzsche, Freud) and institutional outsiders (LeGuin, Keun). These readings will be augmented by the viewing and discussion of films from other European cultures, including Spain, Italy, and Great Britain. Special emphasis will be placed on the evolution of thought on gender from the Romantic to the Postmodern.

PEACE STUDIES

PCST 368: Topic: Holocaust (HMU)

This course is cross-listed with CORE 369 01A

This course will employ multiple perspectives-scholarly historical texts, survivor narratives (written and on videotape), philosophical and theological pondering, and literary works-in order to cast light on two basic questions: 1) What were the basic roles of the Nazi perpetrators and the Jewish and other victims? And 2) What does the Holocaust mean in terms of the decisions that face us in the contemporary world?

PCST 399: Race and Conflict

This course for senior Peace Studies majors will focus on race as a source of conflict and violence, and the elaboration of nonviolent approaches to the transformation of race conflicts. Topics will include: racialization as a social and historical process; racism and its effects; white supremacy and white privilege; and anti-racist movements. We will use a variety of theoretical approaches (critical race theory, post-colonial theory, multiculturalism . . .) to analyze historical and contemporary race conflicts, such as slavery and reparations, racial profiling, environmental racism, and the role of the U.S. at the 2001 World Conference Against Racism.

POLITICAL SCIENCE

POLS 326: Topics in Law

In this section of Topics in Law, students will read recently published works of legal theory that focus on ideas such as equality, the process of judicial decisionmaking, and contrasting theoretical approaches to understanding the law such as law and economics or narrative and performance. Authors may include Cass Sunstein, Richard Posner, Ronald Dworkin or Paul Ricouer. Discussion will be a graded activity and the main way in which we investigate the texts, yet students will also complete a short literature review, a compare and contrast essay, and two take home exams. Students considering law school, those interested in legal, moral and political theory, as well as those who are just curious about the law are all equally welcome. Simply come prepared to read a lot and discuss thoroughly. There are no prerequisites though POLS 111, 221 and 224 would be helpful as they provide the prospective student with a basic understanding of the courts as political institutions as well as practice in thinking theoretically.

PSYCHOLOGY

PSYC 354: Psychology of Ethnic Diversity

The purpose of this course is to educate, sensitize, and stimulate critical thinking about the role of culture and ethnicity in human social behavior. The course will include the following topics: definition of basic concepts in ethnic psychology, social stratification and ethnicity, acculturation and acculturative stress, ethnic identity, risk behaviors, adaptive health behaviors, psychopathology, and clinical and treatment issues.

SOCIAL WORK

SWRK 390: Ethics and Social Work

The goal of this course is to develop the students' ability to make good moral judgments while studying ethical dilemmas in the daily practice of social work. This course satisfies CORE 390 senior seminar for social work majors.

PREREQUISITE: social work senior, concurrent enrollment in 397.

SOCIOLOGY

SOCI 337: Media and Society

There can be little doubt that the mass media profoundly influences the experience of life in contemporary society. Our understandings, attitudes, and actions toward society, institutions, current events, social problems, and even our self are impacted directly or indirectly by the mass media. Examined through the lens of sociology, this course will explore the mass media, as a powerful (yet often subtle) social and cultural influence. While various mediums will be considered, special attention will be given to television. Among the many questions explored in this course will be: to what extent has the mass media transformed our understandings of the world, society, each other, and ourselves? What is the nature of the transformation? What problems do these transformations raise? Is the "media the message," and, if so, what is that message? How are we to apprehend the media and its messages in lieu of these pervasive influences?

THEATER

THEA 210: Dance Studies: Technique, Improvisation, Choreography and Performance (FA)

This course will offer students the opportunity to develop technical skills to improve flexibility, coordination, and strength and to use those skills to increase their range of abilities in creating and performing dance. Modern dance techniques will serve as the foundation for students to build a movement vocabulary, and students will be expected to develop their own movement material in improvisation and composition exercises. Choreographic elements, form, and styles will be explored to guide students in the creative process and performance will be an on-going focus within the class. The goal is for the students to be able to clarify and fulfill all movement so they can physically express their ideas and emotions in movement which is authentic and meaningful, i.e., dance.

THEOLOGY

THEO 309: Themes In Scripture

Cross-listed with CORE 359 pending approval of JC designation

Using selected texts from both the Hebrew and Christian Scriptures, along with supplementary readings, we will read, reflect and write on the historical and contemporary implications of three themes running throughout the Scriptures: prayer, women and community.

VERIFICATION OF MAJOR AND MINOR STUDY FIELDS

CORE CURRICULUM REQUIREMENTS

The purpose of the Core Curriculum is to provide students with a foundation and the intellectual tools necessary to examine the fundamental, recurring questions about ourselves and our world. These questions challenge students to broaden their interests and explore a variety of academic areas. Striving to ask those questions well and make good moral and ethical judgments about them is at the heart of our colleges' mission.

The Core Curriculum is composed of four levels of requirements:

1. Proficiency-based requirements

Foreign language proficiency

Students demonstrate proficiency in speaking or reading a classical or modern language through satisfactory completion of the language proficiency exam or through satisfactory completion of Modern/Classical Language 211 (with any passing grade).

Mathematics Proficiency

Students demonstrate proficiency in elementary algebra and geometry through satisfactory completion of the mathematics proficiency exam or calculus readiness exam.

First Year Students beginning Fall 2001 must complete the Fine Arts Experience requirement by attending 10 designated Fine Arts Experience Events—five events per semester.

2. Cross-Disciplinary courses

First-Year Symposium (2 courses)-- CORE 100 & 101, or HONR 100 & 101

Senior Seminar--CORE 390, GWST 390 or HONR 390 only. Education majors can complete EDUC 390 and SWRK majors can complete SWRK 390. Ordinarily completed during Senior year. Cannot be repeated for credit. Both semesters of First-Year Symposium must already be completed.

3. Disciplinary courses

Only courses which are designated within the course title by the appropriate symbol (FA, HML, MT, JC, etc) may be used to complete the following disciplinary requirements.

FA (4 credits)	Must be from courses that are designated as fulfilling Fine Arts
HML (2 courses)	Must be from different departments or disciplines (ex. Not two literature courses even if they are from different department)
TH (1 course)	Must be 100 level theology course.
HMU (1 course)	Must be from the same discipline as one HML or TH already completed.
JC (1 course)	May be satisfied only after the TH and both HML courses are completed.
MT (1 course)	Must have satisfied the Math Proficiency before the completion of the course.

SSU (1 course)	Must have completed the SSL course first.

4. Flagged courses

Courses may carry 1 or more flags, in addition to meeting Core disciplinary or Major requirements. Flagged courses are specific to the instructor and term. Flagged courses are listed in the Class Schedule and updated lists are posted at the Office of the Registrar.

Discussion Flag (1 course) Must have completed both semesters of First-Year Symposium.

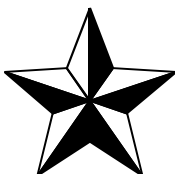

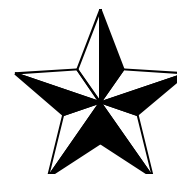
